## **Course Description**

Orthodox Dogmatic Theology can be described as simply "what the Church teaches." Putting aside opinion and speculation, this course concerns itself with the dogmatic understanding of God, His creation, the Trinity, the Incarnation, Salvation, the Church, the Mysteries and the End Times. The first section of this course examines God, the Trinity, Creation and the problems of Evil and Sin, as well as Eschatology.

## **Course Goals**

Students who complete this course successfully will be able to:

- Identify the sources of Christian teaching
- Explain man's understanding of God
- Distinguish the oneness of the Godhead from the Persons of the Trinity
- Understand the relationship between God and His creation
- Discuss the presence of evil and sin in God's creation
- Discuss the God and the Economy of our salvation
